

[Emerging Leaders Academy](#)

The Emerging Leaders Academy (ELA) is a succession planning program targeted to promising, non-managerial staff to help them prepare for leadership roles in their departments and agencies. Participants meet together ten times over five months, with classes designed to help them hone their skills for positions of increasing responsibility while also growing their effectiveness in their current roles. The spring 2013 session will begin at the end of February with locations in Topeka, metro Kansas City, and — for the first time — Wichita, thanks to a partnership with the Hugo Wall School at Wichita State University (WSU).

The KU Public Management Center created ELA to fill a need we perceived among public sector agencies. The limited training resources in most organizations are targeted toward

technical skills and supervisory/managerial training. But with so many baby boomers approaching retirement, we know that organizations are concerned about preparing an adequate leadership pipeline and they often lack capacity to focus on this need themselves.

Program Content: ELA classes balance skill enhancement around topics that are essential to effective leadership (and that can be used immediately in any position) and career planning to help participants identify the role(s) they will seek in the future and prepare to successfully compete for those roles. We use the StrengthsFinder assessment to provide insights about areas of natural interest and talent. Participants also complete a mentor-shadowing process and prepare a professional portfolio designed to highlight their competencies and identify skill gaps. Program graduates cite these activities as crucial to their learning about themselves and how to achieve their goals. Specific class topics include effective communication, generations in the workplace, introduction to budgeting, ethics, and more.
