### **Executive Summary**

#### Personnel

The RML had a complete turn over of staff in Kansas with Whitney Davison-Turley, Technology Liaison, and Janet Ashwell, Kansas Liaison, leaving their positions. Thomas Gibbs, an internal candidate is filling the Technology Liaison position. The hiring process for the Kansas Liaison position is almost complete. The support position in RML administration was upgraded to Project Coordinator and filled by Suzanne Sawyer.

We heartily agreed when Siobhan Champ-Blackwell, Community Outreach Liaison, was named as a Mover and Shaker by the Library Journal.

### **Network Programming**

Staff contributed to the review of the NN/LM centers by participating in the review committees for the National Training Center and Clearinghouse and the Outreach Evaluation Resource Center. We also shared our expertise toward improving NN/LM programming through our membership in the National Online Mapping Center Technical Advisory Committee, Web-STOC Advisory Committee, NN/LM Distance Learning Task Force, Proposal Writing Assistance Work Group, and the Partners in Public Health Steering Committee.

Reports from our regional evaluation activities were released this year. The Network Data Inventory resulted in two reports; one, "The National Network of Libraries of Medicine, MidContinental Region 2002," covering all health sciences libraries in the region and the other, "Hospital Libraries in the National Network of Libraries of Medicine, MidContinental Region 2002," analyzing data provided by hospital libraries in the region. The third regional report, "Focus Groups Final Report," described the feedback we got from Network members who participated in the focus groups.

We experienced a big growth in public libraries joining the Network as Affiliate members--twenty three for the region. The Regional Buying Consortium advisory group organized and is reviewing electronic resources so that the first offering can be made next year.

This was a record year for funding regional projects. Our biggest awards went to two Affiliate members who submitted proposals for the Electronic Access to Health Information RFP. Three state Go Local projects received their one-time funding and six hospital libraries received small subcontracts to help them prove their worth. For National Medical Librarians month, the RML offered to send letters to hospital administrators touting the value of their librarians. Fifty four librarians took advantage of this offer.

Communication technologies are improving and the RML continues to monitor their features and to apply them to our needs. The Resource Library Directors now hold their bi-monthly meetings via videoconferencing using the Polycom system. The RML staff continues to hold weekly meetings using a combination of technologies: phone (audio), VRVS (video), and Sametime (application sharing). We look forward to the day when one Internet based product will serve all of our needs.

We continue to look for ways to improve how the RML communicates with the region. Our web site has a totally new look based on a template and resulting from a review and reorganization of our content. Two blogs are now offering information for those interested in technology and those interested in community outreach. Regular features in Plains to Peaks Post are training and technology columns.

### **Outreach Programming**

Utah is the most recent state in the region to start working on a state-wide Go Local effort. In the next year, half of the region's states will provide Go Local service.

The RML continues to promote consumer health information access among public

librarians by exhibiting at all state library association meetings and whenever possible getting onto the program. A big effort was made in Missouri with the "Unlocking the Mysteries of Consumer Health" conference. RML liaisons assisted in planning the conference and in conducting presentations and workshops.

In the area of public health we made an effort to be a presence on public health organization web sites. We were successful in four states. Molly Youngkin, Utah/Public Health Liaison, was a team member of the NN/LM group that produced "Public Health Information and Data: A Training Manual" and then presented a class at the APHA annual meeting entitled "Public Health Knowledge: Acquisition, Management and Generation."

The Community Based Health Information Outreach Symposium was held at the National Library of Medicine's Lister Hill Auditorium on December 2-3, 2004, culminating a year of planning. The content of this successful meeting will be captured in a supplement to the JMLA.

Siobhan Champ-Blackwell was honored by the Library Journal as a Mover and Shaker for the year. She was featured in the March 2005 issue of the Library Journal.

Marty Magee, Nebraska/Education Liaison, was named a member of the Nebraska State Library Advisory Group.

Whitney Davison-Turley accepted another position within the Archie R. Dykes Library. Thomas Gibbs assumed the Technology Liaison position on February 1, 2005. Thomas is a new graduate of the Emporia Library School program. Janet Ashwell will be moving to Nepal. The Archie R. Dykes Library has interviewed candidates for her position and will be making a selection soon.

Carolyn Osterman left the Administrative Assistant position. Her final day was

June 17, 2004. The position was changed to a Project Coordinator position with additional responsibilities and web skills required. Suzanne Sawyer was hired for the position. Her first day was August 30, 2004.

Graduate students were hired for the areas of Technology and Network Membership. In November, Sharon Dennis, Technology Coordinator, interviewed and hired Jessica Moody, a library school student at Texas Woman's University distance program to work on the web site. Barbara Jones, Network Membership/ Missouri Liaison, hired Jennifer Wieman to work with Network member records to ensure that they are current and correct.

Liaisons had identified a need for an orientation manual to assist new liaisons with the technology and processes used to carry on their work and communicate with their colleagues within this RML and the other RMLs. Liaisons volunteered for sections and are adding additional information to the manual.

### **Network Programming**

#### Resource Libraries

The Resource Library directors felt that quarterly meetings were not frequent enough and the meetings are now held bimonthly. Starting in October, Resource Library Directors meetings switched from the phone to desktop Polycom web cams connecting through the University of Utah's telehealth bridge. The video and audio connectivity has been uneven, but good enough to pursue videoconferencing. Wayne Peay, Director, and Claire Hamasu, Associate Director, used these meetings to report RML news and the directors used these meetings to raise issues of their concern.

Jim Bothmer, Creighton University Health Sciences Library, was sponsored by the RML to represent the region at the American Medical Publishers Association Meeting in Philadelphia. He shared highlights from the meeting with the other directors.

#### Communication

Plains to Peaks Post was published quarterly. Regular features included technology related articles. Ms. Magee started a regular column of training tips. Articles were published in state and regional newsletters promoting resources and services available through the NN/LM. The RML was featured in the health issue of the Wyoming State Library's Library Roundup.

Mr. Peay and Mary Henning, Wyoming Liaison, were interviewed for an article on the Regional Medical Library; Network member services were featured in an article on medical libraries and a patient with spinal stenosis told her personal story of using MedlinePlus.

# Assessment and Evaluation

In January, the NN/LM MCR received its performance review from NLM. The lowest score was for Timeliness of Performance which received a "good" rating. For all other categories, the RML received an excellent score.

Staff participated as members of review committees for the NN/LM centers. Ms. Magee and Ms. Hamasu participated in the National Training Center and Clearinghouse (NTCC) review. Betsy Kelly, Assessment and Evaluation Liaison, was a member of the Outreach Evaluation Resource Center (OERC) site review committee.

Staff also provided input as members of work groups. Ms. Magee was recruited as a member of the National Online Mapping Center Technical Advisory Committee. She attended her first meeting in November. Mr. Peay continued as an advisor for Web-STOC. Ms. Dennis contributed to the NN/LM Distance Learning Task Force sharing the NN/LM MCR's experiences with the use of a variety of communication technologies. Ms. Hamasu and Lisa Boyd, Consumer Health Librarian at the National

Network Office, were asked to co-chair the Proposal Writing Assistance Work Group. They have just begun to address the five charges assigned to them. Ms. Hamasu was also asked to be on the Partners in Public Health Steering Comm-ittee. She attended her first meeting in April.

# Teach one class about evaluation methods and programs for health sciences librarians

Ms. Kelly and Maryanne Blake, NN/LM Pacific Northwest Region, taught "Measuring Your Impact: Using Evaluation to Demonstrate Value" to over fifty librarians in the New England Region on March 2, 2005. Evaluations of the class overwhelmingly (though not unanimously) indicated that the content, while difficult, is important and useful for hospital librarians.

# Consult with Network members applying for awards to assist them in writing evaluation programs for projects

The RML assisted and consulted with two groups as they prepared proposals for NLM's Translational Informatics Grant. Ms. Champ-Blackwell assisted the One World Center with their application. Ms. Kelly and Ms. Hamasu reviewed and commented on the many versions of the proposal prepared by the TC4C (Tribal Connections Four Corners) grant planning group. In April, drafts of the TC4C proposal were shared with the library directors in Arizona Colorado, New Mexico, and Utah, as well as an external review group made up of individuals working in Native American health care.

# Prepare an evaluation plan including logic models, methods and reports for the RML contract

Ms. Kelly began analyzing Activity Reporting System data to determine whether the goals of this year's logic model were addressed. The Activity Reporting System includes a web based form collecting information on liaison activities that is fed into a database. Ms. Kelly reviewed 1,122 activities, coding each to characterize them by type. She then summed the occurrence of the codes related to each of the 5 RML goals. This is intended provide a picture of the types of activities that were conducted and the goals that are being addressed.

The report for the Network Data Inventory conducted in December 2002/January 2003 was released in May 2004. This report provides a baseline for resources and the services available at health sciences libraries in the region. Network members also offered feedback on the services that NLM and the NN/LM offer. Staff reviewed the report and came up with implications of the data for their project areas. At the end of January 2005, Ms. Kelly accepted the final draft of the focus group report as submitted by Elaine Graham, Ms. Graham wrote the report based on the 2003 focus group transcripts and basic analysis provided by Ms. Kelly. The comments from focus group participants yielded indicators for RML action, including continuation and expansion of successful programs in networking, communication, technical assistance, and use of education technologies. In addition. Network members suggested new and renewed initiatives in communicating the RML role, information exchange between the RML and Network members, professional development, library advocacy, and planning for shared purchase of and access to electronic resources.

#### Education

The RML supported the regional chapter meeting held in October by funding a speaker, providing awards for the best poster and paper, sharing information on RML programs during the poster session and offering CE classes.


## Evaluate, update and maintain nursing CD training product

## Extend use of CD training product at another school of nursing

Ms. Magee distributed 37 copies of the Search Strategies CD.

### Evaluate usage and usability of netLibrary

Ms. Magee purchased an additional twenty "books" for the netLibrary collection focusing on administration, strategic planning, evaluation, and marketing. Evaluation was not completed on usage of this resource. Decline in the last two quarters reflects the need to constantly promote this resource.



### **Network Membership**

Over the year, liaisons visited 28 Full and Affiliate Network members. (See Appendix *E for member visits*). Full membership grew by two this year when we added a library in Utah and Missouri. Two libraries that had been closed reopened. We discovered that a bio-tech library had been closed years ago, and we updated their DOCLINE record accordingly. A pharmaceutical company opened a library and soon after closed it, so our records show two library closures this year. Affiliate membership grew tremendously as 23 public libraries from around the region joined the Network and one Network member consolidated DOCLINE services with another, and so dropped to Affiliate member status. (See *Appendix F for Network member status*)

The Wyoming Symposium, an annual symposium held for health information professionals in Laramie, Wyoming, featured a panel of hospital administrators and librarians. Administrators spoke on the value of libraries and what it would take to promote libraries to administration. The panel session was videotaped and made available as a web stream from the MCR web site. The symposium evaluations were uniformly positive about the content and context of the program.

For National Medical Librarians Month, sixty letters supporting the library and librarian were sent to hospital administers in the region. Network members supplied the RML with the names and addresses of their administrators. Other RMLs offered the letter to their Network members. All letters were signed by the RML director. Stephanie Weldon, Colorado/Consumer Health Liaison, surveyed regional members and subscribers to Medlib-l to find out the administrator's response to the letter. She

received responses from 54 librarians. Administrators at 23 facilities responded positively to the librarians after receiving the letter. However, only one librarian said that she would participate in the advocacy letter campaign if it was offered again. Administrators at 30 facilities gave no feedback to their librarians after receiving the letter.

### Develop a profile for electronic resources to be licensed

### Promote benefits of consortium buying plan among Network members

The Regional Buying Consortium advisory group started meeting regularly this year. This group is made up of representatives from each state, a Resource Library Director, the Associate Director, and is chaired by the Network Membership Liaison. The advisory group finalized two documents that state the purpose for the consortium and principles for negotiating with vendors. The advisory group is reviewing electronic resources to determine what the first offerings will be. Twenty-five libraries expressed interest in participating. All Network members are eligible to license the resources at the rate negotiated for the region by Bibliographic Center for Research (BCR). For the first year, the RML will pay for BCR's services.

## Develop and post training modules for DOCLINE updates

Ms. Jones produced three tutorials using Camtasia with the assistance of Ms. Magee. The three modules covered retrieval of reports, changing an institutional record, and changing staff information in an institutional record. They are available from the MCR and nnlm.gov web sites.

#### Promote participation in EFTS

Nancy Woelfl, Director of the McGoogan Library of Medicine, resigned her membership on the EFTS Advisory Board. She was replaced by Sara Andrews, Head of InterLibrary Loan/Photocopy at McGoogan. Lynne Wilson from Primary Children's Medical Center in Utah will continue to represent this region on the board. Six libraries became EFTS participants this year, for a total of 53 in the region.

### Award subcontracts to Network and Affiliate members

Randal Johnson and Ms. Hamasu conducted a distance ed version of their "Grant Writing for \$ucce\$\$" workshop. Polycom web cams were sent out to the four distance participants. There were four on site students. This technology allowed all participants to see and hear each other. PowerPoint slides were clearly broadcast. All students gave the workshop high marks.

Five proposals were received in response to the NN/LM RFP, "Electronic Access to Health Information." The proposals were reviewed by Regional Advisory Board members Paul Schoening, Gretchen Forsell, and Leslie Boughton. The reviewers recommended three proposals for funding. One of the proposals was to develop a Colorado Go Local. Due to the restriction on funding Go Local projects, only two proposals were funded: Community Resource Database by the Johnson County Library in Kansas and Resource Library Health Outreach Kiosks by the Utah AIDS Foundation in Utah.

In June 2004, the RML solicited proposals for \$5,000 awards from hospital Network members. This award was meant to provide support for projects that hospital librarians could use to demonstrate their value to their institution. Communication with their administrator or supervisor was built into the scoring of the proposals. Eight proposals were received. They were reviewed by Regional Advisory Board members Michelle Beattie and Paul Schoening, as well as Ms. Kelly and Ms. Hamasu. Six proposals were recommended and funded:

- Community Hospital, Colorado
- Dixie Regional Medical Center, Utah

- Mary Lanning Hospital, Nebraska
- Stormont-Vail Healthcare, Kansas
- Truman Medical Center-Lakewood, Kansas
- Via Christi Regional Medical Center, Kansas

# **Encourage all full Network members to participate in LinkOut**

LinkOut participation increased by 14 libraries. We now have 61 participants in the region.

#### Continue investigating methods for teaching classes using a mix and match of software and hardware technologies

Experimentation of communication technologies continued: PVX software to allow non-Polycom webcams to participate in Polycom videoconferencing, VRVS participation in Access Grid session. For the RML's use we tested the combined audio/ video for the upgraded VRVS application. We had been using the video function of this videoconferencing application for our weekly staff meetings combined with phone conferencing. The VRVS audio works for up to four people online. Since VRVS tech support advised us that the number of participants shouldn't be limited, additional testing is required. A VRVS reflector was installed at Eccles Health Sciences Library. This enabled us to specify the ports that needed to be open at Resource Libraries and overcome firewalls allowing all liaisons to come up on VRVS. Ms. Dennis successfully tested a free Voice over IP (VoIP) application called Skype. Skype is limited three participants. It cannot be used for our weekly staff meetings but could be useful for smaller RML meetings. Set-up was easy and straightforward and the voice quality is good.

We experimented with the RML Update as a videobroadcast on August 23, 2004 via the Telehealth Bridge at the University of Utah. This was an effort to reach more Network members than would attend a chapter meeting where updates are traditionally presented. Unfortunately there were technical difficulties and, during the broadcast, the streaming stopped. Fortunately the event was recorded and made available from the MCR web site.

Ms. Dennis coordinated with Susan Roberts, Eccles Health Sciences Library's graphic designer, to offer a "Basic Design Principles for Visual Communication" class using Macromedia Breeze. The library currently has a trial version of Breeze. Breeze allows students to see and hear the instructor, as well as to view PowerPoints, and ask questions through chat. An announcement of the class was sent to the mcmla-l list and the class filled in one day (9 people). The class was successfully taught in December.

## Offer training in the use of the video broadcasting unit at Resource Libraries

Progress is slow with our effort to integrate videobroadcasting of local events by our Resource Libraries. Two libraries were trained and one was re-trained. Coe Library at the University of Wyoming invited Ms. Dennis to train staff. She did so on October 18, 2004. Creighton University Health Sciences Library received training last year. They were not successful in broadcasting an event but did record it and made it available on the web for streaming. The mobile unit was upgraded with most of the components pre-configured making it easier to setup and use. Ms. Dennis returned to Creighton University in April to train their team to use this new unit. Ms. Dennis also provided training on the unit at the University of Missouri-Columbia in conjunction with a broadcast.

### Redesign the MCR web site so that it is easier for users to find information

We continue to explore the use of technology to improve our communication with Network members. Regular communication goes out through the mcmla-1. The RML News, a compilation of news items, is distributed weekly on this list. It is archived on our web site.

Led by Ms. Dennis, the RML re-designed the MCR web site. The new pages were made public mid-September 2004. It offers a design template and improved organization.

## Include a bibliography/clipping service/blog on web site

Two blogs are now managed by the liaisons and available from the web site. Ms. Davison-Turley implemented a technology blog this year. Posts included are those deemed to be of interest to the NN/LM's

primary audience (health sciences librarians with a technological bent). She received positive feedback from two Network members and a question for more information on what exactly a blog is. The blog is available at (http://www.bloglines.com/blog/whitneydt). During the year, Ms. Champ-Blackwell promoted her new Bringing Health Information to the Community (BHIC) blog through listservs and presentations. This blog debuted during the last contract year to provide information of interest to community based organizations.

# Develop and run at least two Journal Clubs on technology

Ms. Davison-Turley hosted an in-person technology journal club starting in August. The purpose of the journal club was to look at the profession and the access to information in a digital world. In the future,

# Inform health organizations and libraries about health information resources and services of the NLM and NN/LM

One hundred seventy-five outreach activities by RML staff and 46 subcontract outreach activities were conducted this year. Subcontractors helped us to reach constituents in three states: Utah, Colorado, and Missouri.

## Develop and maintain state pages for the region

Ms. Moody started mining the Internet for content for the state web pages.

#### Consumer Health

#### Continue working to develop state groups

In December, Ms. Magee met with Kit Keller and Mary Jo Ryan of the Nebraska Library Commission to discuss "seeding" of consumer health libraries. They developed an initiative to fund three pilot groups - in Eastern Nebraska (Norfolk), Central Nebraska (Kearney), and Western Nebraska (Scottsbluff), places that have both good hospital libraries as well as good public libraries, that would be willing to cooperate to improve consumer health information

access. The University of Nebraska Medical Center McGoogan Library would serve as a mentor in the development of these programs, due to their 20 year history with the Consumer Health Information Resource Services (CHIRS).

## Identify groups in each state and plan for Go Local implementation

At the end of February, Ms. Weldon organized the review of the Utah, Missouri, and Wyoming applications for Go Local funding. Missouri and Wyoming have existing programs. Utah is starting a statewide Go Local service. Reviewers were Maggie Farrell, MCR Advisory Board Member, Ms. Kelly and Ms. Hamasu. Funding was awarded in April 2005 with each project receiving \$25,000.

### Manage and promote the consumer health resource database

Ms. Weldon continued her efforts to enlist support for the Consumer Health Information Directory. This is a database of resources recommended by subscribers of the CAPHIS listserv (Consumer and Patient Health Information Section of the Medical Library Association). There has been interest from various people but no committed effort.

#### Provide training to public librarians

There were 69 demonstration or training events involving public libraries; about 1/3 were offered by subcontractors funded by the RML. Some of this training took place during the 27 visits that RML staff made to public libraries.

One of the biggest events developed for public librarians was the "Unlocking the Mysteries of Consumer Health" conference held in Columbia, Missouri on June 10-11, 2004. Although not an RML activity, RML liaisons were very involved in its success. This conference attracted public and health sciences librarians primarily from Missouri interested in providing consumer health information services. Ms. Weldon and Ms. Jones participated in the planning and preparation for this conference. Ms. Weldon also created an alternative medicine handout and presented drug information resources. Ms. Jones gave a presentation on the resources of the NN/LM and Ms. Ashwell presented on minority health information

Another meeting that included presentations from the NN/LM, was "Libraries and Health Information Forum" held in New York City, November 8-9, 2004. The forum was sponsored by Libraries for the Future (LFF). Ms. Hamasu and Rhonda Allard, NN/LM Middle Atlantic Region, were invited to give a presentation on NLM and NN/LM resources and services and encourage participants who were not already members (there were some) to contact their RML and become a member. About 40 people were invited from all over the country. Many of the participants gave presentations describing programs that are making consumer health information accessible as a

regular service from the public library or to a specific group or on a specific topic (example: African Americans, environmental health). It was impressive to hear that quite a few of these efforts were funded by NLM or NN/LM. Following the forum a smaller group strategized next steps. LFF will be seeking foundation money to fund this next step. They definitely want to partner with the NN/LM since our goals for health information access are so similar.

## Exhibit and/or present at state library association meetings

Liaisons exhibited at all the state library association meetings and were on the program for the meetings in Wyoming, Nebraska, and Colorado.

## Identify and contact web masters of state public health departments

The RML contacted personnel in all state health departments and public health associations asking them to add NLM resources to their sites. By the end of the year the public work force in four states had links to NLM resources from at least one of the web sites.

# Provide classes on NLM products and services or library-related demos to public health workers

There were 43 demonstration/training events in the region for the public health workforce this year. About 1/3 of the events were sponsored by subcontractors funded by the RML.

The liaisons used different strategies to introduce the public health workforce to the resources made available by the NLM and the services available by the NN/LM. Ms. Youngkin formed an alliance with Karalee Atkinson from the Utah Department of Health's (UDOH) Training and Education Center and Sherri Evershed of the University of Utah's Telehealth Network. They traveled the state visiting each of the local health departments and promoted the services that each of their organizations provides. Six local health departments were visited during the year.

Ms. Magee was a plenary speaker for the National Institute of Mental Health conference where she introduced ClinicalTrials.gov to the attendees. Ms. Youngkin was part of the team that produced "Public Health Information and Data: A Training Manual" and presented a class at the American Public Health Association annual meeting entitled "Public Health Knowledge: Acquisition, Management and Generation."

# Exhibit and/or present at state public health association meetings

Liaisons exhibited at the public health association meetings in the states of Colorado, Nebraska, and Utah.

## Develop a plan for an informatics component in a public health program

Ms. Ashwell and Dr. Won Choi, head of the University of Kansas' public health program, have started planning for a one credit informatics course for public health

students. Their ideas will be taken back to the faculty.

### Community Outreach

Twenty-five outreach activities with a minority audience were conducted in all states in the region except Wyoming and Missouri. Subcontractors helped us to reach 25 African American, Hispanic, and Native American consumers. (See Appendix J for Minority Outreach Maps)

Ms. Jones and Ms. Ashwell were part of the planning committee for Bi-National Health Week held in October. The Missouri events were part of a national effort with events in 162 cities and 17 states. They shared Spanish language materials available from NN/LM. Ms. Ashwell demonstrated MedlinePlus en espanol for the group. From October 10-17, they were participated in and exhibited at Bi-National Health Week. They offered health information resources at the Guadalupe Center in Kansas City as one of the health promotion activities for Mexican immigrants and their families. It was a very successful event.

Ms. Ashwell has become a member of the NAAG (North East Advisory Group) for Alianzas. Alianzas is made up of representatives from different organizations, who are interested in improving social, health, economic and educational conditions for the Hispanic community in Kansas City. They meet regularly to decide how to partner and share resources. One of the activities that Alianzas supports is Bi-National Health Week.

Ms. Champ-Blackwell and staff from other RMLs who program for minority and other special populations have organized to work cooperatively and to promote their outreach. They have regularly scheduled teleconferences and call themselves NN/LM Special Population Outreach Coordinators

(SPOC). One of their goals is to make the position of a Special Population Outreach Liaison a requirement across the RMLs. They developed a multi-cultural page for the NN/LM web site.

#### Co-sponsor Community Based Health Information Outreach Symposium

The Community Based Health Information Outreach Symposium was held at the National Library of Medicine's Lister Hill Auditorium on December 2-3, 2004, culminating a year of planning. Mr. Peay and Maxine Rockoff, New York Academy of Medicine, co-chaired the team of eleven individuals representing the NLM and the NN/LM. The approximately 150 invited participants represented libraries, community based organizations, funding organizations, and government agencies came together to discuss and learn from each other about strategies for community based outreach. The meeting produced recommendations for NLM's Health Disparities Report and for the 2006 NN/LM RFP.

Ms. Hamasu and Cathy Burroughs, Associate Director of the NN/LM Pacific Northwest Region, developed an evaluation for participant feedback within two weeks following the symposium. Fifty-three (32.5 %) of the participants responded. Cynthia Olney, PhD, Evaluation Consultant, and Maryanne Blake, Education & Communication Coordinator, NN/LM Pacific Northwest Region, analyzed the data. They concluded that:

"The strongest theme of the conference evaluation was collaboration. Over and over, respondents talked about the need for partnerships among many organizations to provide effective health information outreach as one method for addressing health disparities. Comments for the symposium were generally enthusiastic, with several people requesting that the event be repeated in the future. Respondents reported that they gained a lot from the experience, particularly in learning strategies for outreach and meeting potential partners for future projects."


